Taught by Professor Elisa New and filmed documentary style, **Poetry in America** blends archivally-rich classroom lectures with expeditions to historical sites, video seminars, one-on-one discussions, readings, and performances by and with such guest interpreters as Joe Biden, Andrea Mitchell, Bono, Eileen Myles, Randi Weingarten, Frank Gehry, Amber Tamblyn, Herbie Hancock, Elizabeth Alexander, Juan Felipe Herrera, Nas, Anna Deavere Smith, and many others. SPRING 2018

POETRY IN AMERICA: THE CIVIL WAR THROUGH MODERNISM

This course spans a critical era in American literature. Commencing with the Civil War and its industrial aftermath, this course proceeds through the first half of the 20th century and the Modernist revolution. Featured authors include Whitman, Melville, Lazarus, Robinson, Frost, Eliot, Millay, Williams, Hughes, Cullen, Stevens, Moore, and many others.

POETRY IN AMERICA FOR TEACHERS: THE CITY FROM WHITMAN TO HIP HOP

This course is designed specifically for educators of all kinds—teachers, school leaders, policy makers, librarians—seeking to develop their expertise as readers and teachers of literature. Treating poetry in social context, the course pays close to attention to urbanization, immigration and migration, mass media and the arts, social justice, and changing ideas of adolescence.

FALL 2018

POETRY IN AMERICA: THE MAYFLOWER THROUGH EMERSON

This course covers American poetry in cultural context through the year 1850. Beginning with Puritan migrants and the early literature of New England, topics include folk poetry of the American Revolution, poetry of freedom and slavery, nature and nation, and the emergence of print and literary culture in the new Republic. Major figures include Bradstreet, Wheatley, Longfellow, Poe, and Emerson. This course is especially suitable for teachers of American literature and American history.

POETRY IN AMERICA: WHITMAN AND DICKINSON

This course allows deep immersion in the work of the 19th century's two most original American poets, both of whom influence poets to this day. Part One of the course treats Whitman's radical re-imaginations of the city, the body, the nation and the self; Part Two focuses on Dickinson's unique formal innovations across poems treating nature and science, death and faith, the role of women, and the role of art.



FACULTY

Elisa New is the creator of Poetry in America, the Director of Verse Video Education, and the Powell M. Cabot Professor of American Literature at Harvard University, where she teaches courses in classic American literature from the Puritans through the present day. Her multi-platform initiative, Poetry in America, has convened conversations with many thousands of participants worldwide and features special guests Bill Clinton, Elena Kagan, Nas, Billy Collins, Herbie Hancock, and more. Poetry in America, the television series, will air nationwide in April 2018.
